Editor's Message



s our period without a Vicar draws to an end I have been reflecting on what the interregnum has brought to our Church.

coped tremendously well. We have seen numbers drop a bit at some services but not at the major ones. This may in any case be a trend in society at large, where there is so much going on each Sunday that parents find they have difficulty in fitting everything in. Andy and Barbara are active in the Lemsford Local History Group which has made great strides in recent years. I hope you have enjoyed the articles arising from their work that I have been pleased to publish in the Magazine. A good example is on pages 12 and 13; a local author researching particular servicemen in the Great War naturally came upon the LLHG website which he found tremendously helpful. No wonder, since it is really informative—a model of its kind. The results make fascinating reading. Do look at the pictures inside the back cover which relate to it. I was impressed and I hope you will be too. A classic example of good coming out of evil.

Dedication of Brocket Babies' Memorial

Saturday 9th April at 2pm.

This short sensitive service, conducted by the **Revd. Ron Ingamells**, will start in church and conclude in the churchyard by the new memorial. **Everyone is most welcome to the service and the** refreshments that follow in the Annexe.

As many readers will know, Brocket Hall was used as a Maternity Hospital between 1939-49. Over 8,000 babies were born: 62 babies who died are buried in Lemsford churchyard along with an unknown number of stillbirths. This is to be a very special day for the families involved and help to

bring closure for the families of still born babies

The memorial has been very generously donated by Justin Burgess proprietor of **Burgess Memorials** and the Diocesan and church fee was donated by Brocket Hall. The memorial is now in place near the annexe and reads:



In memory of the precious BROCKET BABIES taken from us so soon September 1939 - November 1949 You touched our lives for the briefest of moments Yet you will stay with us forever Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these.

What is Sue Stilwell up to now?

The de Havilland Community Project was born from discussions between the Hatfield Churches as to the best way to serve the people living in the new housing developments on the old airfield site. Instead of building a church there it was decided to start a community project that would focus its energy on building cohesive communities. Funding was secured by the Methodist Church and the Church of England—and the project was set up in 2008. It is led by Methodist Minister Nina Johnson, who lives on the Salisbury Village with her family.

Today the Project offers **JourneyLight**, a fresh expression of church run on the second Sunday evening of each month at the Howe Dell Community Centre Hall. The all age meetings offer an informal time of worship - to sing songs, pray, hear words from the Bible, plus activities for everyone. The service is led by Nina Johnson, Chris Hancock (a Local Methodist preacher - and also an excellent guitar player and singer!) and Sue Stillwell. They hope soon to be able to offer a second opportunity in the month to explore the Christian faith.

J ourneyLight has been the place of a number of baptisms as families get involved with the Project. Many seeds have been sown over the years and there are visible signs of growth. One is a Club, which runs every Saturday morning in the Howe Dell Community Hall. Local families and residents work in conjunction with Nina and Sue to provide activities for children and families - within a safe environment.

Another initiative has been Youth Clubs, providing a safe space for young people to be with their friends after school at Howe Dell Community Hall and Green Lanes School, during term time. The de Havilland Community project is the only provider of youth provision actually on the Salisbury Village and Hatfield Garden Village housing developments.

The project aims to encourage local people to take responsibility for the provision - volunteering is positively welcomed. The project is inclusive and involves people of all faiths and none.

From the Hands of Heroes

A nyone who has visited St Paul's Cathedral recently will have been impressed and moved by its beautifully embroidered altar frontal, made in 1918-19 by wounded and disabled servicemen as part of their rehabilitation. Painstakingly restored for the First World War centenary, the frontal is the subject of a forthcoming book entitled 'From the Hands of Heroes', written by me. It tells the story of the embroidery and reproduces the delicately hand painted pages of a Memorial Book created by the hospitals involved that contains 138 of the names of the soldiers and sailors who worked on the frontal.

Volunteers at St Paul's have embarked on a great deal of research into the soldiers and sailors who contributed to the frontal and many of their families have been traced. Some of the men have remained elusive, however, and it was while writing 'From the Hands of Heroes' that I came upon the name of Private Augustus Cecil Wren of the 6th Battalion, the Bedfordshire Regiment. Finding that 'Gus', as his family knew him, was one of the local servicemen featured on the First World War section of the Lemsford Local History Group website, I contacted chairman Andy Chapman and attended the next meeting, where I was able to meet and talk to several members of the Wren family.

As a result, the new book will include pictures of Gus and some details of his war experience that he lost a brother, Christopher, at the Somme, that he was himself badly wounded (his niece Olive recalls that he walked with a limp), and that he survived the war to marry, raise a family and tend the gardens at Brocket Hall and other big houses in the area. For everyone connected with the St Paul's altar frontal project, the discovery of information about Gus was very significant because it opened up a whole new line of research. Because the Memorial Book page including Gus's name follows a page headed 'Durris Auxiliary Hospital' in Scotland, the assumption had been that he and the other men listed had been treated there. In fact, as Gus's granddaughter Helen confirmed, he was treated at Chailey Hospital in Sussex, which became world famous for pioneering an innovative handicrafts-based therapy called 'educative convalescence'. The Chailey link has since been confirmed by the East Sussex County Council archive, which has a photographic album from the time showing an embroidery class with a caption referring directly to the St Paul's altar frontal.

If you visit St Paul's, do look for Gus's name inside the Memorial Book and take a moment to reflect on the war story of this young Lemsford man - how he left his job as a garden boy at Brocket Hall to serve his country, was severely wounded in battle yet ended his war embroidering a unique and wonderful cloth for one of the world's finest cathedrals.

Diocesan News

Bishop welcomes decision on Sunday trading

Following the vote in the House of Commons on 9th March the Bishop of St Albans, the Rt Revd Dr Alan Smith, who speaks in the House of Lords on economic affairs as a Lord Spiritual, issued the following statement: "MPs have listened to the concerns of the many people, community groups and businesses opposed to the further deregulation of Sunday trading, and have voted to reject the Government's proposals.

Our current Sunday trading arrangements balance the needs of businesses and consumers with those of families and communities, and as such are backed by the majority of the public. Given the lack of clear evidence about economic benefit and concerns about impact on workers and their families, it is right that the Commons has dropped these proposals.

The Government now needs to give a firm commitment to follow through on its promises to strengthen existing protections for Sunday workers. It would be unfortunate if that were to end up sidelined as a result of today's vote."

The following letter was published in 'The Observer', 21 February 2016

SIR – I welcome the Prime Minister's initiative on mental health care, but I am puzzled why the Government at the same time wants to cut out-of-work benefits to those with mental health problems.

Before Christmas, the House of Lords voted to remove two clauses from the Welfare Reform and Work Bill, cutting the benefits of new claimants to the Employment and Support Allowance Work Related Activity Group (ESA WRAG) from £102.15 to £72.40 per week, also cutting their Universal Credit. ESA WRAG is paid to sick or disabled people currently declared 'not fit for work', but who might be able to return to work in due course, assuming they receive appropriate treatment, training and support. Significantly nearly 50% of ESA WRAG claimants – almost 250,000 individuals – experience mental health problems.

The House of Lords called into serious question the notion that those found to be unable to work can be incentivised back to work by a cut to their living standards. The Government wants to bring the level of benefit paid to those in the WRAG into line with benefits paid under Job Seekers Allowance, with the stated rationale that a cut would "incentivise work" and is pushing for the Lords' decision to be overturned.

This should not be allowed to happen. A cut in benefits may incentivise the fully able to find employment, but the Government has yet to provide any evidence that the same would hold true for those in the ESA WRAG, the majority of whom really do want to work.
