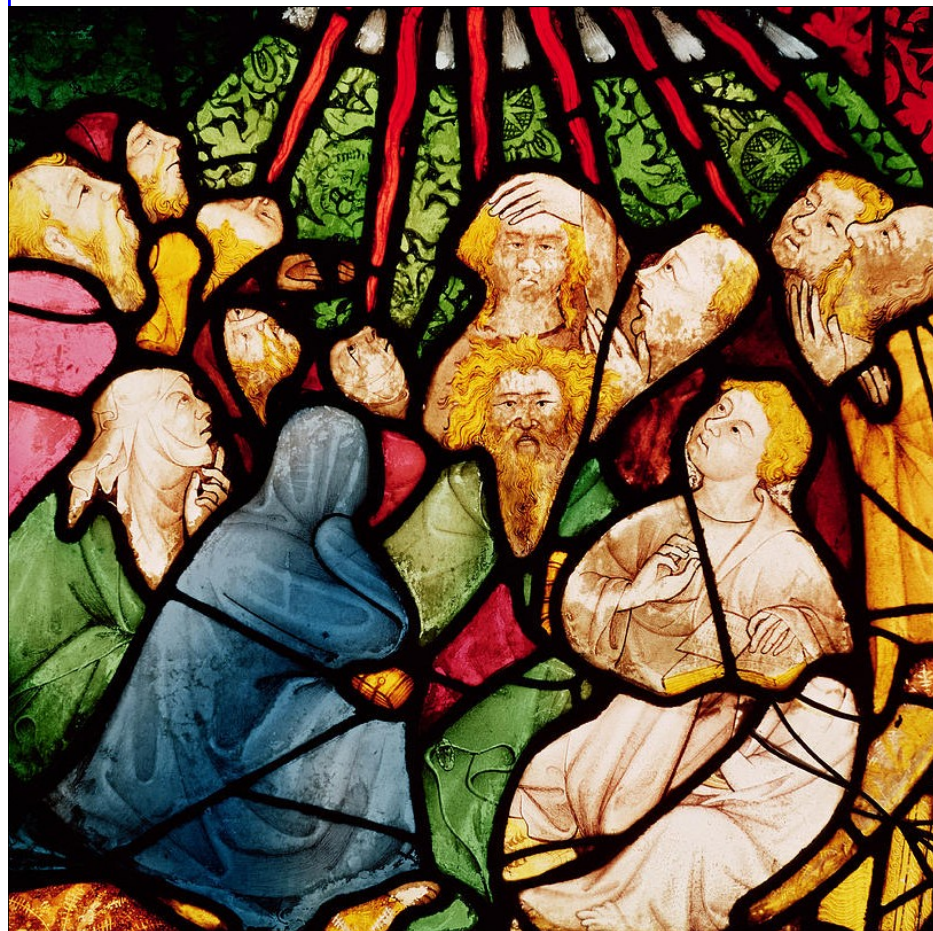

Thy Kingdom Come...

Jesus in the gospel of John gives us the most wonderful expression of prayer: he prays for himself as he faces the cross; he then prays for his disciples who will face the consequences of his death and resurrection; and finally he prays for all believers that they may know the love of the Father and the work of his Son.



Prayer is at the heart of the Christian Journey. For the last three years the Church of England has asked Christian Communities to pray for the 'Coming of the Holy Spirit' during the days between Ascension Day (May 30th) and Pentecost (June 9th). This campaign has become known as '*Thy Kingdom Come*', and the results have been remarkable.

We tend to think of the Church of England as something that really only affects England but in truth it is a global church. Basically wherever the commonwealth is there is an Anglican representation. The call to prayer of 'Thy Kingdom Come' has spread far wider than the Church of England. In the U.K. all the major denominations are taking part, each with their unique ways of praying. It is the same story right across Europe, America, Africa, Australasia, India, South America and Canada. On Monday 13th May I went up to church to have a quiet little bonfire to be ready for the second Garden Work Party on the 18th. I warned the school but not the car drivers along the village road, so I was visited by a concerned motorist. I thanked her for caring for our church; then one of the teachers who had not heard from the office walked round to check and then the Vicar came, having been alerted about the smoke. I was barely an hour at my conflagrations! It is good to know that there are folk keeping a watch over our Church. This reminds me of Psalm 17 where the writer asks God to “Watch over me like the apple of your eye, in the shadow of your wings hide me”.



The Work Party went well, so many thanks to the people who helped. One of the tasks was to clear rubbish dumped in the hedge by the road down to the Village. The result was considerable as can be seen from the photo.



The 5 year plan to improve the gardens has started, focussed on the Diocesan Quinquennial Report. The Holly Trees at the front of the graveyard have been removed and some other shrubs have been controlled. We are approaching the Western Red Cedar hedge gently, and the base was cleared by the Work Party. The wild flower meadows are starting to look lovely.

The Diocese has a ‘Living Churchyard Day’ on Saturday 13th July at Potton Church. It would be good if someone who cannot do hard work were to attend and become our expert. Please contact me if this would interest you. **Mary Douglas** 07850527050.

For some time we have been collecting provisions in a box at the back of Church, which **Marion Cleveland** takes to a weekly Food Bank. This is run by **New Zion Christian Fellowship** in Cole Green Lane, Welwyn Garden. **Ian Matthews** from the Fellowship tells us what happens there.

The Food Bank exists to provide food to those in need. Each Wednesday morning we set up five tables, with different types of food on them – carbohydrates, proteins, fruit and veg, drinks, and miscellaneous. Our customers are referred to us by Care professionals (health visitors, schools and social workers) who give them vouchers after proof of need. They can take three items from each table. We also have bread and some items from local supermarkets, so they normally go away with at least twenty items.

We are seeing a number of “regulars”. At the same time, some drop off the radar, and a few new faces appear each week. This gives us the opportunity of developing relationships with quite a number of people. This is part of what we believe is the Lord’s desire for us; we give them time, and wish to show the Lord’s love for them.



As we continue in this work, we are increasingly aware that the Lord has put on our hearts a greater purpose than that of providing tins, jars, packets and cartons to those in physical need; He wants to redeem souls as well as vouchers, and we find ourselves praying and caring for the spiritual wellbeing of those who come for help.

In order to fulfil the Lord’s command to us, we need food. In this respect, we never cease to be amazed by the Lord’s ingenuity. He supplies us with food and funding from an amazing variety of places: other churches, (like St John’s), schools, local companies, individuals, to name but a few.

Without workers, our task would be impossible. For a fellowship of 70-80, we have an amazing number of volunteers. We have roughly 12-15 helpers per week, which is 15-20% of our number. In school holidays, that figure often rises even higher. To me, this shows how important this area of the church’s life is to its members. We are a body of people who clearly care for each other, and want to reach out to those around with the message of God’s love for them.

Paul Butler writes:

We can again think ourselves very fortunate with the weather we had on fete day. It may have been considerably cooler than last year's scorcher, but the day was dry which was most important.

This year we had a number of new musical offerings, with three bands, a brass band and 'Jive Swing' a local dance group. This alongside our more familiar performances in the church and the school children's singing and maypole dancing there was hopefully a lot to keep everyone entertained and warm.



Whilst we were unavoidably let down by several attractions at the last moment hopefully our inflatables, crockery smash, coconut shy and archery kept everyone active. Alongside this the home baked cakes and jam stalls did a roaring trade. The BBQ, with new vegetarian options, was always busy and I know it takes a lot of effort by those who volunteer to run those stalls

As a result of the generosity of the public, our sponsors and the hard work of our volunteers and helpers we have again been able to raise in excess **£12,000** for the school PTA, church and our other charitable causes locally. Thank you to everyone involved.

After all the meetings, prep, shopping, cooking, baking, setup and last minute cancellations...! This is what it's all about... And the sun shone a little too. Massive thanks to all the committee, staff, parents and volunteers who worked so hard to make this happen so successfully. Well done to all, an amazing team as always.

Since its inception in 2003, Lemsford Local History group have produced a display for nearly every Lemsford Fete. We have explored, 'The Great North Road', 'Lemsford Church', 'Brocket Hall', 'Lemsford Village', 'WW1' and many more. For this year's Fete we decided that the subject should be the **Graveyard**, partly because the War Memorial was unveiled on 20th July 1919, one hundred years ago.

We had a small display in the hall showing information about the graveyard's history and records of the twenty men who gave their lives in WW1 and whose names are on the memorial. There was also a Power Point presentation and an outlet for selling our publications.

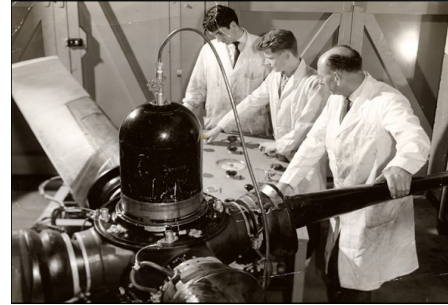
We were lucky the day was dry as our main display was in the graveyard. We had asked the local community to contribute memories of relatives in the graveyard, and members of the group to research well known graves. This produced twenty-four articles. In the graveyard we had double sided display boards erected next to each of the 24 graves. On the front of these was basic information and a QR link to the website article, while the back showed a brief history. A team of guides were on hand to show the public around.

The response from the public was positive and the combination of hard copy display boards and links to the website made relaying information an enjoyable experience.

All the articles were interesting. For personal reasons three resonated with me: one about **Brenda Lines**, a 6 year old girl who was knocked down by a car in 1922 outside the house I live in; another on the **Brocket Babies**, who died between 1939 and 1949 at the Brocket Hall maternity hospital, and for whom the group had campaigned successfully for a permanent memorial; and that for **Stan Borrie** a founding member of LLHG, one of life's true gents and greatly missed.

After 16 years its quite hard to find new aspects of Lemsford. to research. We have a large archive and website with over a 1000 images. This project though produced further memories.

I learnt about families that moved to the area like **Bill & Lily Curtis**, whose daughter Alison had some wonderful memories about her parents who lived in Brocket Road from 1980. ‘When Bill died in 1985 it was a great comfort to Lily that his resting place was just up the road in the village church’. I loved a photo of Bill working at De Havilland.



Bernard Wallis, who helped to build Mill Close in the village, was researched by Marion Cleveland. She produced a fascinating article about him creating one of the biggest poultry farms in Hertfordshire opposite the village hall. During the late 1920’s or early 1930’s, Bernard (known as “Bunny” to his family and friends) decided to take up poultry farming and moved to a council farm at Brocket Road, Lemsford. (The house is now named Meadowcroft.) The chickens were initially kept in large wooden “houses” but he later expanded by acquiring army style “Nissan” huts. One of these housed two incubators to facilitate egg hatching.

The piece on **Charlie Wager** was not only interesting but had the best image of the display. Charlie was a churchwarden at St. John’s for 16 years (1977-1993) and will always be known as the man who put the gardens into the Garden City. He joined the WGC Co., which was constructing New Town, early in his life, and spent the rest of his long career there, becoming head gardener.



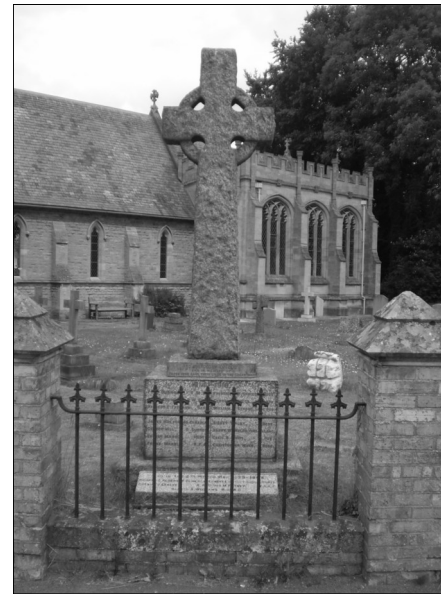
The article on *Cyril Roden*, Churchwarden at St John's for 26 years (1965 - 91) - and who helped to install the Church bells— showed the development of Brocket Road, a subject I want the group to research for 2020 as part of the WGC centenary celebrations. In 1933, when he and Edith moved as newlyweds into 32 Brocket Road, fields surrounded the few houses along this country road and New Road was just a dirt track.



All 24 articles may be read in full on our website via a link on the Home Page. These will be updated as more information comes in.

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If you missed this event it will be repeated on **Saturday July 20th** from 11 am with an open day in St John's. **One hundred years ago on this date the War Memorial was unveiled** and we will remember the 20 men who died in WW1 and are listed on it with a special event. Details of this are still being settled, but it is hoped to involve descendents of some of them. The graves of their relatives may also be highlighted. More information will be put on the website as soon as possible.

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Ramblers Walking Holidays Part III *A pioneer of Package Holidays*

In 1955 the company set up an air holiday subsidiary 'Wings' and the easier walking grades and sightseeing tours migrated to the new product. The early flights were on the twin engined Vickers Viking, a post war civilian passenger aircraft based on the Wellington bomber and carrying up to 38 passengers, flying from either London Airport (before it became what is now London Heathrow) or the now largely forgotten Blackbushe Airport (near Camberley).

Air travel was then exotic enough for our brochures to advertise the inclusion of the services of an air hostess aboard the flight as well as of 'our resident Wings representative' for the tour itself. Between 1957 and 1958 the size of the programme had doubled, a fortnight visiting Austria and Switzerland cost 36 guineas and the first regional flights from Manchester appeared.

Within 20 years, following the rapid development of package holidays by air, the RAS walking holiday operation had effectively become a subsidiary of Wings and in 1974 changed its name to the more familiar Ramblers Holidays Ltd.
